


Most popular hat colors

- scarlet and black were hard to achieve and so these were another indication of wealth and status.



Today, we will be trying to recreate a pleated tipped hat in the Elizabethan style



Hat parts



Admiral Sir John Hawkins 1591

Needed Materials

- Blocked hat tip
- 1/2 yard wool or silk
- ¼ yard 2 ply buckram
- Millinery needles
- Heavy thread
- Thimble
- Straight pins
- Head plate
- Marker/pencil
- Chalk
- Long ruler
- Manila paper
- Large compass (optional)
- Architects Curve (optional)



Step 1

Measure head plate

 Measure your head 1 inch above your ear

- add 1/2 inch. This will be your head plate size
- Cut out the corresponding head plat oval from your handout.



Step 2 - Brim

1.Make an + on your buckram



2. Draw head plate in center matching up with your +



3. Add 2-2.5 inches from the actual headplate line, this will by the brim of your hat.



If you want a point in the front, simply add it at this time.

4. Cut out the outside edge of your brim


Step 3 – Brim Fabric

- Adding fabric to your brim:
- Use your brim to cut out 2 pieces of your fashion fabric fabric add ½ inch seam allowance.
- Mark the front, back, and sides with of fabric with a pin
 - use the ruler to draw the + on your fabric
 - place your headplate pattern
 on + matching up + lines
 - Trace around pattern with chalk
 - Pin fabric together with buckram inside
 - Turn in fabrics with one side over buckram and one simply turned under.



- With the edges sewn together, give a quick steam to the brim this will stick the fabric to the buckram
- 2. Draw head plate in center matching up with your +
- 3. From the headplate line, measure 1/2 inch inside from from your head plate.

 This will be used for the tabs which will attach the tip to t he brim
- 4. Cut out the **INSIDE** oval





tabs

 Cut easing tabs out to the original head plate line fold tabs with fabric and buckram up.




• Set to one side

The Tip

- Measure from the center top of the tip, to the bottom of the stock. Add 1/2"
- Cut a circle of appropriate circumference
- Mark the + and draw an + mark with pins at each point
 - This will be the front/back/sides on your tip


Marking lines for pleats

- Using a ruler, mark an +, then a + through the first + and so on until you have ½-¾ " between them at the edge of the outside of the circle.
- Mark 3-4" from center of circle, mark another circle
- Mark a second circle 2" lower



Stitching thread for pleats

- Using heavy weight thread – start with tail on side of fabric with no chalk.
- Stitch using a long running stitch up and down at each chalk mark on both circles.



Pulling Pleats

- Place the center of the circle over the center top of tip, place pin in center
- Pin quarterly around the bottom of the stock
- Pull the threads to make small pleats
- Arrange pleats evenly around tip
 - Leave threads in fabric



Sewing fabric on tip

- Fold pleats inside of stock
- Using heavy duty thread, sew running stitch around edge.
 - Make sure to put a stitch though each pleat to help set it.



Attaching Tip and Brim

- With the brim
 - Cut easing tabs out to the original headplate line
 - Fold tabs (fabric and buckram) up
- Place stock on brim
- Using heavy weight thread and a stab stitch sew through stock and tabs.



Adding Lining

- Cut a circle the same size as the outside fabric, of lining fabric.
- Sew large darts from the raw edge to 3 inches from the center - you'll need about 8-10 darts
- Sew inside your hat folding under raw edges and securing with a short whip stitch.



Embellishment

 Add a hatband and feathers or just some ouches
